A smiling Bob Maclachlan looked pretty chuffed as he made his way in first place ahead of his fellow team mates Todd Jago and Tony Baldwin but even more stoked was Shaun Hardcastle, a novice with less than a years experience in a single as he surfed home in his 'banana' coloured Hurricane in 3rd place just ahead of Tony. Saturday was another brilliant day of racing. The OC6's took off in the morning to race 15km with the open women's division first up.
