It continues to be a vaka that provides opportunity, challenge and self awareness for Niue women. The team competes in local, national and international regatta. Representation of Niue in this code at an international level has been consistently supported by those with heart, strong faith, perseverance and endurance.

Following VT's second representation of Niue at the 2007 South Pacific Games a goal for 2008 was to compete at the 13th International Va'a World Sprints, Sacramento, USA. Preparation for the Worlds focused on a demand for higher performance as individuals and as a team unit. By February the Worlds team was in place and a coach secured. Our sister paddler in Wellington travelled to attend monthly training camps which were compulsory live ins. We all continued to train as a core through the winter period coping with hail on lake Pupuke gail force winds on the Tamaki estuary and at time sub sub zero temperatures.

Life's constant trials kept us grounded as we juggled our family, relationships and work commitments. The adage "what doesn't kill ya, makes you stronger" was ringing in the ears and hey that theory was tested a few times!! Highlights of the trip included the race venue, the media attention, the competition, the food, the shopping, the glorious weather and the friendly people. We've returned with a strong sense of achievement and a benchmark for our women to sustain for future competition.
