I am pleased to be able to present the annual report for Waka Ama New Zealand which showcases the exceptional achievements we've had this year.

The staff of Waka Ama NZ are crucial to the continued success of our sport led by our exceptional Chief Executive Lara Collins. This year we again added to the capacity of the Waka Ama NZ team with new staff supporting the Aukaha strengthen and adapt programme. We are proud of the commitment, dedication and level of professionalism shown by the team that is recognised nationally and internationally.

A special thanks to the board of Waka Ama NZ for their continued commitment to the development of the sport. This year has been one of consolidation and strengthening as we've reviewed our strategy and built board competencies. All our board members bring unique strengths to their roles and all are equally passionate about waka ama.

There have been two main areas of work this year for the board. The first is the achievement of Governance Mark with the aim of improving our governance processes. This has involved the development and refinement of policies, board skill development and enhanced board efficiencies. As part of this work we have also undertaken a strategic plan refresh.

Core components of our 2021-2025 strategic plan have been retained, including the tūmanako of waka ama for all for life, and ngā uara of manaakitanga, whanaungatanga, hauora and tū tangata. We have added a commitment to Te Tiriti o Waitangi to reaffirm the importance of this foundational document to our mahi. We have also developed a purpose statement to clarify the core functions of Waka Ama NZ; more whānau experience wellbeing, connection, achievement and belonging through the culture of waka ama. The previous strategic plan had five strategic priorities; celebrate, develop, grow, connect and sustain waka ama. These have been consolidated into three aronga; develop, grow and perform. Importantly the refreshed statement of strategic intent for 2024 to 2029 includes ngā hua rautaki / strategic outcomes with key initiatives and measures aligned to each. This was a significant piece of work for the board with support from Sport New Zealand and Waka Ama NZ staff. We are confident this refreshed strategy will provide clear direction for the years ahead as well as key indicators to measure our progress.

We had significant success at the World Sprint Championships in Hilo, Hawaii, taking the largest contingent of paddlers from Aotearoa. The level of competition was high and our elite teams and our club teams both represented us with pride.

For only the second time the Va'a featured in the Paralympics and Peter Cowan came away with a bronze medal at his first Paralympics. We are so proud of Peter and congratulate him and coach Myk Nuku on a fabulous campaign.

I have no doubt the year ahead will be another busy year and I look forward to working with the board, the staff and the entire waka ama whānau to continue to promote, sustain and celebrate waka ama - for all, for life.

2024 has been a year filled with many exciting highlights for our organisation, our sport, and our waka ama whānau as we work towards strengthening capability and capacity, getting more people in the waka, and sustaining international success. Our longstanding vision of 'Waka Ama - for all, for life', underpinned by our values, continues to drive our organisation at all levels.

Over the past year, our office has grown, now with a dedicated team of ten kaimahi based around Aotearoa in Auckland, Taranaki, Gisborne, Hamilton, and Whangārei. This includes seven national roles and three regional development roles. Our staff took part in Te Reo Māori professional development through a ten-week learning course with Hukea, not only supporting personal development but aligning with our organisation culture and values. Our staff came together multiple times for strategic and operations planning, including a Matariki themed two-day staff hui, to support the alignment of workstreams across the organisation and build whanaungatanga within our growing team.

A fit-for-purpose system remains a key focus for the organisation and with the implementation of key development projects, we continue to strengthen our waka. The Aukaha project has contributed to regional capability and capacity development including the appointment of three Regional Development Coordinators, our Rautaki Rangatahi continues to guide us in the rangatahi space with the support of our Te Reo Taiohi rōpū, and Te Rōpū Whaikaha has seen new developments in the tāngata whaikaha space; all contributing to the sustainability of our sport for present and future generations.

Our financial knowledge and acumen have improved this year, thanks in part to the contributions of our account contractors, Ruud Smeets and Susanne Arck-Weeber. Their expertise has enabled us to refine our internal processes and strengthen our financial and accounting policies to better future-proof our growing organisation.

After several years of generating a financial surplus, this year we budgeted to make a financial loss and have achieved our budgeted loss by investing in our organisational growth, our future and our vision for waka ama in Aotearoa.

We have begun to deliver our revenue strategy by growing our whānau of partners and sponsors that we can work with to achieve mutual outcomes. We welcome Air Tahiti Nui and ACC as partners to our whānau. Our organsiations share common values and synergies and their input into Waka Ama NZ will help to support our operational growth, our public awareness and contribute to our aligned outcomes. We are excited to work with them both. Additionally, thank you to all our wonderful whānau of partners and sponsors who continue to support Waka Ama NZ, we look forward to continuing to work with you in 2025.

As we navigate the ever-changing economy we will be implementing small increases to our event fees and affiliation fees. These small increases will ensure we can continue to develop and grow waka ama and provide quality opportunities for our waka ama whānau.

At a community level, our membership has grown by 15%, this is no mean feat and can be attributed to the amazing dedication of our clubs and local communities, ensuring more whānau experience waka ama around Aotearoa. With five new waka ama clubs this year and several more in the pipeline, we look forward to the continued growth in participation and supporting this growth.

Our team successfully delivered a full season of events; the implementation of the Event Manager role has been vital in this success and has effectively streamlined this workstream. Additionally, the High Performance Coordinator role also contributed to the successful and seamless management of the World Sprints campaign for our Aotearoa team.

I had the privilege of cheering on Peter Cowan in Paris at the 2024 Paralympic Games. His bronze medal in an exhilarating final cements both him and Aotearoa waka ama in history. Peter's achievement is a testament to his hard work and the support of his coach Myk Nuku, their whānau, communities, and organisations like High Performance Sport NZ and Canoe Racing NZ. We're excited to continue working with Peter, Myk, and continuing to build momentum in this space and the many positive ripple effects of this amazing success.

IVF World Sprints in Hilo saw our largest Aotearoa contingent ever, with 589 paddlers and many more whānau and supporters travelling to Hilo. We had many exceptional results in what were challenging conditions. We are very proud of all our paddlers, teams, coaches and managers who represented Aotearoa across Elite and Club events.

Ngā mihi to Ngaire Pehi (Board Chair) for her leadership and the Waka Ama NZ Board for their commitment to our kaupapa. We are fortunate to have such a passionate and supportive Board, creating great synergies between governance and management. To our growing Waka Ama NZ kaimahi team; we have a dedicated staff that go above and beyond to ensure the best job is done for waka ama. Amiria, Aroha, Deb, Jo, Kereama, Maruwhare, Ngāriki, Tara and Trevor, thank you all for your dedication and professionalism and for ensuring that our waka ama whānau are always at the centre of everything we do.

Thank you to all our regions, clubs, volunteers and waka ma whānau for all the passion, dedication and aroha that you bring to waka ama. We are a unique sport made truly special by everyone involved in making it happen across every level of delivery.

Waka Ama NZ are committed to strengthening our waka through the implementation and measurement of our new strategic strategy. This new strategy will help us to focus on building our internal capability and capacity to continue to get more people in the waka and support our performance workstream. A key focus for the upcoming year will be to align our mahi with our strategic goals, tackling significant initiatives in coaching and development, and assisting our clubs and regions to comply with the new incorporated societies' regulations.

Our achievements in 2024 reflect our commitment to our renewed purpose; ensuring more whānau experience enhanced wellbeing, connection, achievement and belonging through the culture of waka ama. We look forward to building on these successes in the coming year.

The entire waka ama whānau in Aotearoa and throughout the world are devastated by the passing of Kiwi Campbell. Kiwi contributed to waka ama as a paddler, coach, executive, and dedicated member of Horouta Waka Hoe Club, and recently as a board member of Waka Ama New Zealand.

The list of Kiwi's achievements is exhaustive; she has attained the highest achievements on the water as a kaihoe and kaihautū, at international and national levels, and she has coached numerous teams to international and national titles, year after year. Kiwi is one of our sport's most successful paddlers and coaches. In 2016 this was recognised when Kiwi was named the Māori Sports Coach of the Year and in 2020 Kiwi received Te Tohu Whakarewa Tāngata in recognition of her outstanding contribution to the sport of Waka Ama in Aotearoa.



Kiwi has impacted thousands of people in our sport and her community in Tairāwhiti. Kiwi's dedication and commitment to our rangatahi was awe inspiring, she held them close to her heart and worked tirelessly to expand their horizons throughout Te Moananui a Kiwa and offer them opportunities they otherwise may not have had.

There are so many ways to describe Kiwi, she was exceptional in the true sense of the word. She was formidable, her strength and determination unsurpassed and core to her success. Kiwi will leave a legacy for all those she paddled with, coached, mentored and befriended. We have all been enriched by her presence in our waka ama whānau.

Our deepest sympathies go to those who loved Kiwi and knew her the best—her husband Bruce, her sons Mairangi and Maia, her mother Irene, and all her close Horouta Waka Hoe whānau. Our hearts are breaking, and we share the pain and depth of your grief.

WAKA AMA NZ STRATEGY **RAUTAKI**

The refreshed Waka Ama NZ Strategy is set in place to support the development and growth of waka ama throughout Aotearoa and meet the needs of the sport and our waka ama whānau. This strategy sets a strategic direction for our organisation over the next five years (2024-2029) and is guided by our purpose of 'more whānau experience enhanced well-being, connection, achievement and belonging through the culture of waka ama'. With the outlined focus areas, strategic outcomes, initiatives, and measures, we look forward to implementing this strategy to grow and develop waka ama in Aotearoa for our waka ama whānau.

TĀ TE RINGA TOI WHAKAMĀRAMA

The Waka Ama NZ Strategy design consists of modern Māori designs that visually represent the deeper connections to Te Ao Māori. Beginning with the boarder design patterns, a unique 'haehae' pattern has been created to represent the stages of water as it relates to the kaihoe as they interact with it. Breaking the surface, rippling out, and powering outwards. This subtle design element has been used to speak to the connection Waka Ama NZ has to the taiao. There are four square design patterns located in the lower middle, these each relate to the values of Waka Ama NZ. From left to right; whanaungatanga, manaakitanga, hauora, tū tangata. These symbols are a contemporary take on long existing concepts within Te Ao Māori, adapted for Waka Ama NZ. Finally the focus areas, ngā aronga, shown as hoe, each paddle uses a variatoin of the same puhoro design to form its own unique tohu. Develop hoe uses puhoro to show new concepts forming from one another. Grow hoe shows the puhoro coming together in support of one another as a foundation of growth. Perform hoe forms a mangopare, the symbol of strength shown by kaihoe as they showcase their own abilities.

This new strategy was created in partnership with Māori Artist, Ben Thomason (Ngāti Raukawa), from Ara Auaha Moko Studio

Cost of Governance



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YOUTH STRATEGY

RAUTAKI RANGATAHI



Our Rautaki Rangatahi, youth strategy, continues to guide our organisation with developing waka ama for rangatahi, and is further supported by Te Reo Taiohi.

The Rautaki Rangatahi and Year 1 Activity Plan (April 2023 - March 2024) was co-reviewed with the Te Reo Taiohi. There was a 50 % achievement rate of the outlined tasks in Year 1. Some of the key achievements were:

- Implemented a tuākana rōpū from Te Reo Taiohi alumni and fostered relationships.
- Hosted 6 online hui and a wānanga.
- Increased Waka Ama NZ social media content and frequency through rangatahi feedback.
- Engagement with other rangatahi through surveys and feedback boxes.
- Increased staff knowledge of the kaupapa, sharing of insights, and implemented work activities utilising rangatahi feedback.

A key learning was that there were too many activities in the Year 1 Activity Plan therefore it needed to be scaled down and be more focussed for meaningful impact. These achievements and learnings were applied to the development of the Year 2 Activity Plan, with Te Reo Taiohi, and key activities have been set for the next year.

The Year 2 Activity Plan is focussed on development, promotion, and advocacy:

- Support and develop Te Reo Taiohi rōpū members (develop confident and capable rangatahi leaders)
- Promote and advocate rangatahi engagement (show what Te Reo Taiohi are doing, show what rangatahi are doing, promote the sport)
- Promote and advocate rangatahi engagement (how schools/clubs/regions can engage with rangatahi, importance of rangatahi voice)

These activities help align our focus to the Rautaki Rangatahi and guide discussion kaupapa for our Te Reo Taiohi rōpū. We look forward to another year of implementing this important kaupapa.





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Te Whāinga: Increase Rangatahi involvement in waka ama

YOUTH ADVISORY GROUP

TE REO TAIOHI



Te Reo Taiohi, our Waka Ama NZ youth advisory group, had another productive year of informing, advising, and providing insights to develop waka ama for rangatahi, from a rangatahi perspective. The Rautaki Rangatahi continues to guide the rōpū and provides a foundation for kaupapa kōrero.

Key highlights over the past year include building whanaungatanga between rōpū tuarua, co-reviewing the Rautaki Rangatahi and Year 1 Activity Plan, developing the Year 2 Activity Plan, and contributing feedback that informed key pieces of Waka Ama NZ mahi.

We hosted a wānanga for Te Reo Taiohi in Mount Maunganui in May this year which was an awesome opportunity for the rōpū to come together. The wānanga included mahi regarding the Rautaki Rangatahi and Year 2 Activity Plan, identifying key elements that make waka ama enjoyable for rangatahi, identifying some goals for the rōpū, brainstorming what a rangatahi coach development wānanga could look like. The wānanga also included a coaching and paddling session, a games night, and a hīkoi up Mauao.

We look forward to more engagement with the ropu over the next year and how we can further develop waka ama for rangatahi ensuring a rangatahi voice is utilised.



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STRENGTHEN & ADAPT PROJECT

AUKAHA

The Aukaha project continues to focus on strengthening the capability and capacity of the waka ama system at a regional and local level so that our sport can continue to grow, thrive and adapt. The initial project plan was refreshed and re-aligned with an operational plan to ensure clarity and direction of the project over the next couple of years.

Significant progress has been made over the past year, led by our Aukaha Project Manager, which has included governance development at board level and working groups and the development of fit for purpose regional plans. Notably, three Regional Development Coordinators (RDC) have been employed in the Auckland and Tai Tokerau (Northland) regions and planning of future RDC's in other regions is underway.

Adapting and re-defining what development looks like within each region has provided challenges along the way, however understanding the development stages of each region has been important. We look forward to another year of implementing the Aukaha project and proactively engaging with our regions to further develop the waka ama regional system.



TE RŌPŪ WHAIKAHA







Te Rōpū Whaikaha welcomed the inaugural members of the working group in November 2023 and have since had six hui, including one face-to-face. A key achievement of the rōpū was the development of the Rōpū Whaikaha Action Plan which sets out the priority areas and activities for the next year, giving direction to the rōpū.

The rōpū have provided feedback to Waka Ama NZ in relevant areas related to kaihoe whaikaha and on relevant kaupapa. In August, a kaihoe whaikaha survey was released to our waka ama whānau as a way to gather insights and feedback from kaihoe whaikaha in Aotearoa; the results from this survey are being processed. A key highlight of this rōpū is the connections between members who sit across various roles in waka ama and other sports in the whaikaha community.

We look forward to working collaboratively to deliver on the action plan over the next year, including supporting kaihoe whaikaha have a go days over summer, and developing our mahi with the insights and advocacy provided form the ropū

The Waka Ama NZ Puna Ako, Learning Hub, made some small progress over the past year including strategic planning, initial stages of system development, and exploring online learning.

The Coastguard Boating Education Waka Ama Safety course booklet was re-developed and is in the final stages of being transferred to an online learning course. We have continued to support Toi Mai and have provided endorsement for those from within our Waka Ama whānau who require consent to assess the Waka Ama NZQA Unit Standards available for rangatahi. We also met with Sport NZ coach development staff to brainstorm and initiate early stages of redeveloping our coaching system.

Coach and learning development was identified as a high need within our waka ama whānau and has been included in our new Waka Ama NZ strategy and Sport NZ initiatives as key priority areas. We continue to face challenges with delivering coaching courses in the community and building a network of facilitators capable of delivering these. With the planned system development, we hope to minimise challenges and provide learning opportunities over the next year.

LAKE KARĀPIRO, CAMBRIDGE | 14TH - 20TH JANUARY 2024

SPRINT NATIONALS

The Waka Ama Sprint Nationals took place at Lake Karāpiro supported by manawhenua Ngāti Koroki Kahukura and Ngāti Hauā. The event continues to be an intergenerational event catering to kaihoe inclusive of tamariki, rangatahi, pakeke, kaumātua, adaptive paddlers, and paddlers of all ethnicities and cultures. That is what makes Waka Ama 'mā te katoa, mō āke tonu', 'for all, for life'.



The event took place over seven days and provided 394 races including heats, semis, and finals in W1, W6, and W12 categories and was also a qualifying event for the 2024 IVF World Sprint Championships.

The racing was exciting with a high level of skill on display, supported by friendly sportsmanship and whanaungatanga on and off the water. There was a vibrant and inclusive event atmosphere that included a cheerful spectator bank, a packed vendor lane and notable medal ceremonies. The highly popular corporate race had the most teams since its inception, with 23 teams coming together for some friendly yet competitive racing. Whakaata Māori again provided coverage of the event for all our whānau at home to enjoy watching.

LAKE TIKITAPU, ROTORUA | 19TH - 22ND MARCH 2024

SECONDARY SCHOOL NATIONALS

The Secondary School Nationals took place at Lake Tikitapu, Rotorua, co-hosted with Te Waiariki Purea Trust and supported by manawhenua Ngāti Whakaue and Tūhourangi. The highly popular secondary school event brought together 1907 rangatahi from 115 schools throughout Aotearoa from as far north as Kaitaia and as south as Wakatipu. Our rangatahi brought high energy, supportive sportsmanship, and displayed amazing skills; making this our most popular national event.



The event provided increased participation opportunities for rangatahi through the inclusion of multiple divisions, Te Ihu, Te Kei, and Te Takere, providing for all rangatahi to progress past the heats. This year's event held 197 races over the four day event, and despite the chilly conditions, the rangatahi displayed some impressive skills and competition on the water.

Participation at the event continues to grow, and there was a 19% increase in participation compared to the 2023 event. A notable mention of Te Wharekura o Mauao who had 88 rangatahi in attendance, boasting the highest number of participants from one kura. The event was also attended by two schools from Tahiti, as international paddlers, who provided some competitive racing for our Aotearoa teams. Canoe Racing NZ, for the first time, was included in our event as a way to support the growth of their sport for rangatahi, strengthen our partnership, and maximise the event setup. The NZ Secondary School Canoe Racing Champs catered to 107 paddlers and provided 43 races.

TAKAPUNA BEACH CUP

The Takapuna Beach Cup returned to the shores of Takapuna, Auckland, hosting 957 national and international paddlers. The three-day waka ama event held in February, supported by Taniwhā Outrigger Canoe Club, is the biggest changes race in Aotearoa and provides paddlers with a race course with stunning views, including one of NZ's iconic volcanoes; Rangitoto.



Despite a three-year hiatus due to COVID and weather cancellations, the event was well attended by paddlers from Aotearoa, Australia, Canada, Cook Islands, New Caledonia, Hawaii and Tahiti.

The event included junior races, short 5km fun races, relay races, and a marathon changes race. The main event was the OC6 42km marathon changes race, set on a course out and around Rangitoto, Motutapu, and Rakino Islands. The stunning NZ summer weather provided perfect conditions for paddlers and showcased some competitive racing for the duration. The event also hosted an international paddlers evening where paddlers were welcomed to mix and mingle, providing an opportunity for whanaungatanga to build our waka ama relationships on an international scale.

The camp was well attended by all selected Aotearoa paddlers from the five elite representative teams, as well as a few club teams.

WAKA TO WORLDS

Waka to Worlds returned for Season 2; a show that followed the Aotearoa Elite J19 Wāhine and Tāne teams throughout their World Sprint Champs campaign. Hi Mama Productions created the series of ten episodes, with support from Te Māngai Pāho.

The camp was focused on building whanaungatanga between the teams and provided a collective space for training preparations. As part of the camp, there were also two information sessions for the paddlers from Drug Free Sport and High Performance Sport NZ. Saturday evening marked the official acknowledgement and celebration of the teams, and each received part of their Aotearoa uniform. The evening was supported by a special korero from para athlete Peter Cowan and coach Myk Nuku, as they spoke about their experience, journey, and advice within the high performance space.

Thank you to manawhenua Ngāti Whātua Ōrakei, our amazing team of volunteers, all partners and sponsors, national and international paddlers, and all our waka ama whānau for contributing, supporting, and being part of the event.

The show focussed on showcasing rangatahi performing and excelling in elite sport on the world stage, celebrating our rangatahi involvement in waka ama, and promoting the use of Te Reo Māori throughout. The series followed our rangatahi throughout their preparations, including key training camps where their commitment and hard work was on display, as well as the knowledge applied by their coaches. The series concluded in Hawai'i as the teams put their preparations to the world stage and performed against the world's best paddlers.

The episodes were released on our Waka Ama NZ facebook and instagram, as well as Whakaata Māori, and were well received by our waka ama whānau. Thank you to Hi Mama Productions for the production highlighting our rangatahi, and to all kaihoe, coaches, managers and whānau involved.



HILO, HAWAII | 16TH - 23RD AUGUST 2024

WORLD SPRINTS CHAMPS

The 20th International Va'a Federation (IVF) World Elite Sprint Championships and World Club Sprint Championships took place at Hilo, Hawai'i, in August and was hosted by Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association. The event had 2884 paddlers from 27 different countries, with our Aotearoa team consisting of 589 paddlers - our biggest ever contingent to attend a World Championships event.

Our Aotearoa team consisted of five elite teams who were selected through trials (J19 Wāhine, J19 Tāne, Open Wāhine, Open Tāne, Para Mixed) and club teams from 38 clubs throughout Aotearoa; from Junior 16 to Master 80 division. Aotearoa showcased a strong performance throughout the event and won a total 63 medals across the elite and club championships (14 gold, 32 silver, 17 bronze). We are proud of the achievements of all our kaihoe who competed at the event and the results across the board highlighting the skill and dedication of our Aotearoa paddlers.

The racing took place in Hilo Bay, on an ocean course, which for some of our kaihoe was their first experience in sprint racing on a course like that. The event wasn't without its challenges, however a determined Aotearoa team displayed a high level of adaptability and sportsmanship throughout the event. The tropical weather also provided some challenging conditions, including wind and rain, all adding to the experience.

Peter Cowan was selected for the NZ Paralympic team to compete at the 2024 Paris Paralympic Games 6 - 8 August, after a successful silver medal performance at the ICF Canoe Sprint World Cup in Szeged,

Hungary.

After a training period in Europe before the event, Peter traveled to Paris with his coach Myk Nuku, to debut at his very first Paralympic Games in the Para Va'a VL3 V1 200m. Delivering two great performances in his heat and semi final races with times of 50.17 and 48.93, Peter progressed to the A final and successfully placed 3rd with a time of 48.28 securing a bronze medal in an extremely competitive race. Scott Martlew also competed in the event and placed 4th in the B final.

Congratulations to Peter for winning a bronze medal and the first ever Para Va'a medal at a Paralympic Games for Aotearoa. A true testament to all your hard work and commitment, to the guidance and knowledge of your coach Myk, and to the support of your amazing wife, tamariki, and whānau. A special thank you to High Performance Sport NZ, Paralympics NZ, and Canoe Racing NZ for their support.
